The recount process is directly managed by the District Court and the Judge appointed for a recount will contact all candidates affected by a recount to tell them of the arrangements.

We have been told there will be a recount for Tāmaki Makaurau Māori Electorate, and your candidate should be contacted shortly.

The Judge will normally brief the candidates ahead of the recount. There is normally also a briefing for the appointed scrutineers on the process at the start of the recount. Under section 183 of the Electoral Act one or more scrutineers can be appointed by any candidate affected by the recount.

The Commission has a support role to the Judge who runs the whole process.

- Loss of Voting Place due to localised events such as fire, loss of power, loss of access to voting space, etc.
- A flood or incident closes a key road between the HQ and other HQs and key voting materials cannot be delivered (applicable to Tamaki Makaurau Electorate)

Other risks with a rating score of 12 or more on the risk register are:

- Recruitment (posed a significant risk to Manurewa Electorate in 2020)
 Not enough people apply to work or they drop-out before start of contract
 Quality of people applying for roles is not at the level required
 There are insufficient or poor quality applicants for the manager roles
- Increased COVID-19 cases in the community
 Loss of staff/replacements needed at HQ and voting places



6.2 Logistics and Supplies

For 2023 General Election, the crucial part for Tamaki Makaurau is the logistical planning of movement and security of supplies and key voting materials during advance voting, election day and post-election periods.

Although the main bulk of the supplies will be coming directly from National Office to the headquarters of all general electorates, this is largely dependent on assumptions made during the planning of the voting service delivery. Any shortfall brought about by deviations from the electorate plan vs actual voting patterns will have to be managed from the Tamaki Makaurau Electorate Headquarters.

The Logistics and Supplies team will have to familiarise themselves with contact details and physical locations of electorate headquarters so that supply of additional voting materials will be fast and efficient. Clear communication channels must be established and finalised before the voting period.





Tamaki Makaurau's voter turn-out in 2020 General Election is 65.12% and, with a rating of 72nd, is the lowest turn-out in the country.

As Tamaki Makaurau's boundaries cover 15 different general electorates in the Auckland and North region, the onus on how to improve participation rates fall on all Electorate Managers looking after these general electorates.



The number of special declaration votes processed in 2020 General Election was 5,527. With an increased effort in face-to-face community engagement and more presence at events for Maori Electoral Option and 2023 Enrolment Update Campaign (unable to organise or attend events in 2020 due to Covid-19 pandemic), it is expected that there will be no major increase in the number of special declaration votes this year. More electors, hopefully, will enrol and update their details in time for the print-out of the electoral rolls.

ESTABLISH THE RIGHT TEAM CULTURE

Building a supportive and collaborative team culture at the onset is crucial to high-performance, confident decision-making and proactive interaction. The values, beliefs, behaviors, and attitudes shared by the team will lead towards the successful delivery of the 2023 General Election.

We are all guided by the Electoral Commission's **TAUMATA** values of **Tūhonotanga** (bringing people together to increase participation in democracy), **Aratakina** (knowledge transfer guiding towards greater understanding), **Uakaha** (being dynamic and energetic in what we do), **Manaakitanga** (demonstrating generosity and empowering people) and **Tika** (doing things right, doing the right things).

Each value is equally important and complements each other, and what it will look like in practice will evolve based on the professional and personal experiences of the team.

MAINTAIN CLEAR COMMUNICATION CHANNELS

Encourage open communication by providing a safe space where the team can share information in a transparent, honest and consistent manner.

- Combination of regular informal/formal meetings and get-togethers with team on all levels to update on work progress, share ideas, initiatives and raise concerns.
- Have an open-door policy for the Electorate leadership team.
- · Task or assignment deadlines are clear and must be adhered to.
- · Ask team for feedback followed by proper action, if necessary.
- Make the team aware of escalation process at an electorate level that will set boundaries and channels of decision-making in order to solve problems quickly and with clarity.

MANAGE TEAM AND INDIVIDUAL PERFORMANCE

Any team is only as strong as its weakest member. It is important to set everybody up for success and as Electorate Manager, my responsibilities to my team are:

- Stress importance of doing things right the first time and ensure processes are followed.
- Emphasize importance of accountability, traceability, and pride in work accomplishments.
- Identify where the gaps are in the team with regard to skillset to guide next steps in the recruitment of other team members.
- Encourage and support team to raise issues when mistakes happen, so it can be rectified, or its effects mitigated.
- Empower every member of the team so they can identify situations where they can
 exercise confident decision-making vs situations where they need to escalate issues.
- Inform, enforce, and monitor Health and Safety guidelines at Headquarters and out in the field it is everybody's responsibility.
- Identify individuals who can perform other roles in the lead up to the election period and for post-election activities.
- Celebrate every success however small or big they are.

The Commission releases this information to parties earlier than to the general public to give parties an opportunity to provide feedback and to assist parties with internal planning. Please keep this information confidential because we want to communicate it to the voting public once the voting places have been finalised.

Encouraging participation

One of our statutory objectives is to facilitate participation in Parliamentary elections. One way we achieve that is providing services that are easy for people to access and are simple to use. This contributes to high rates of participation in elections.

For this election the Commission has worked with PAK'nSAVE store owners in the North Island and The Warehouse nationally to provide voting services in their stores. These locations provide convenient opportunities for people to vote, and where we have used such locations in the past (e.g. in shopping centres, which we will use again this election), we have received a large number of votes.

To address areas of low turn-out, the Commission has also implemented a community led approach to provide voting services informed by their local community. This means offering voting services in locations and on dates and times suitable to local communities. We are also working with these communities to recruit local people to work in our voting places.

Voting places open on Election Day

There may be instances on Election Day where we cannot conduct the preliminary count of votes in the actual voting place because it is still open to the public. For example, voting places within PAK'nSAVE stores. In these circumstances, the preliminary count will either be conducted securely nearby within the same building complex, or undertaken in an electorate headquarters. In such cases, the Electorate Manager will give notice to the constituency candidates or their scrutineers at the voting place, and afford the scrutineers present at the voting place the opportunity to accompany the ballot boxes to the counting place and observe the preliminary count.

Placeholders

You will notice in the spreadsheet that there are a number of sites described as 'Placeholders'. This is where a desirable location is known but a suitable venue has not yet been either identified or confirmed.

Assessing voting places

All voting places are assessed for suitability against standard assessment criteria and the proximity of other voting or advance voting places. The attached 'Voting Place Assessment Criteria' document lists the criteria used.

You will be provided with a final list of voting places and the coordinates for the sites by 6 September.

Next steps

Should your party wish to provide feedback, please do so through **one central point of contact who can speak on behalf of the party**. This will help ensure that each party has oversight of feedback that is being given for the party and means we can work through any comments in an efficient way.

All feedback should be emailed to with the subject heading "Voting Places, Attn: Director, Voting Services" before the close of business on **Monday 17 July**. Please do not go directly to an Electorate Manager with your feedback.

We will carefully consider your feedback and act in response to it where possible.

As mentioned above, after final checks in August, confirmed advance and Election Day voting places will be released publicly via www.vote.nz on 6 September. This information will also be available from our call centre and will be included in the EasyVote information packs sent to all enrolled voters.



Following the meeting with the team in Auckland, I can provide the following information:

1. How we came to select the marae as a Voting Place:

A contact Tekou from the Manurewa Marae spoke to one of our Community Engagement staff at the beginning of the year to see if they could use the Marae as a voting place, this information was passed onto Erin (SE&P) and then a Teams meeting was scheduled to discuss. Erin and Georgia (VS) plus the Community Engagement member meet with Tekou, Hilda and also Tarsh Takutai Kemp from the Manurewa Marae.

At a meeting in February, our community advocates in Auckland also recommended that we use Manurewa Marae along with other marae to improve services not only to Māori but to communities with low engagement. They recommended Papakura, Manurewa, Ruapotaka and Orakei Marae, which we all used during advance and election day voting. The community advocates are Pania Tautoko Vriginia Tracey and Rob

The site was recommended because it had been recently used by government agencies to undertake activities such as COVID 19 vaccinations and to encourage participation in the Census. It is also used as a community hub by virtue of its medical service and food bank.

2. Who was employed to work at the voting place – were any staff from the marae itself. The marae provided six names of people that could work at the voting place. Four were employed. None were actually staff from the marae – they were people that volunteer there and have employment outside the marae. One other person, who only worked on election day, is on the Board of Trustees for the marae but also is employed outside of it. In total around 14 different people worked in the voting place over the election period.

3. Treating

As per previous correspondence, as soon as we became aware of the association being made between voting and receiving a free hangi, we informed them that access to hangi and any other free items / activities cannot be dependent on voting – and must be available to anyone. They replied and acknowledged this requirement. We are not aware of any further activity that saw free kai being provided only to people that voted.

4. Payments and funding

The electorate manager has followed up repeatedly requesting an invoice for the hire of the marae as a voting place. No reply has been received and so no payment has been made. I confirmed that the marae has not received any funding from SE&P in relation to the GE2023.

I hope this information is helpful. Please let me know if you would like anything further.

I'm writing regarding the complaint I made on 1 November regarding treating at the Manurewa marae. I wish to provide further information to the Commission in its consideration of that

complaint; bring the your attention to an additional irregularity we'd ike the Commission to consider; and make a request as to the timing of the Commission's decision on whether or not to pass these complaints to the police.

Additional information

- 1. I note some of the Manurewa marae's Facebook live videos appear to have been removed from their Facebook page as at today. I don't know why that might have happened. I understand the Commission may already have downloaded copies of those videos, but we also have copies if needed.
- 2. Some of the marae's Facebook content, however, has not been deleted as yet. I'd like to bring the Commission's attention to further evidence suggesting the purpose of Manurewa marae's activity was to treat voters:

In a Facebook Live video on 13 October, the marae said:

- It was up to "Activation 11" in a programme of 12 activations (the last one to take place on 14 October, which included a free concert and 1,000 free hangi among other things at the marae)
 - In our view, the fact that this programme was titled as "activations" indicates clearly the purpose of the programme, namely to "activate" people who might not otherwise be active into voting, using the lure of free things to encourage them. Indeed, in this video the free offerings are collectively referred to as the "activations" which even more clearly indicates their purpose. This is important because the marae's intent is an important element of the treating offence.
 - The number and timing of the activations also closely coincide with the period where voting was open with the election, which is a further indication of the programme's intent.
 - The advertising of "activation 12" on election day, which involves 1,000 free hangi and a free concert at a polling booth location, alongside an encouragement to vote at that polling booth, is also treating.

<u>In a Facebook post on 2 October</u>, the marae says:

Come on down to the Marae apōpō (tomorrow) for our RANGATAHI ACTIVATION. A packed full day of Magic and greatness.

We have HIP HOP CLASSES, KARAOKE and much more. Our VOTING station is also open for our whānau over 18 who need to VOTE.

Happening tomorrow Tuesday 3 October from 10AM till 4PM at our Marae.





- This post shows that the hours when free things are available at the marae during the 3 October "Activation" are timed to precisely coincide with the hours when the polling booth at the marae was open. Further, the post contains a clear link between casting a ballot and obtaining free hip hop classes, karaoke, hangi, coffee, ice cream, donuts, and haircuts, which is treating.
 - This link between voting and freebies is, of course, made even more explicit in the Facebook Live video the following morning which I shared with the Commission previously that outlined a ticketing system the marae used to provide free items specifically for people who cast a ballot at the polling booth located at the marae.
- 3. Now that the final results have been declared, it is clear that the scale of the potential treating (which the marae itself says runs to thousands of people) is significant enough to affect the election result, where the final margin is four votes. This scale, relative to the margin in the election, makes it even more imperative that this treating is investigated by police.


Timing of Electoral Commission decisions

As you know, faces a deadline of 1 December to file any electoral petition in relation to Tamaki Makaurau. It would be deeply unjust if that deadline were to pass without all parties knowing the Commission's decision on whether or not to forward these complaints to the police, as that decision may be relevant to any electoral petition.

Our firm view is that it is the responsibility of state agencies, rather than other parties, to pursue potentially corrupt practices in elections, and we ask that the Commission address that responsibility in a timely fashion. We therefore request that the Commission expedite its decision on these matters, and release that decision well in advance of the legal deadline of 1 December for filing any electoral petitions. I also request an update on the Commission's intentions about when it will make a decision, so I can pass that information on to dec ision-makers within

ESTABLISH THE RIGHT TEAM CULTURE

Building a supportive and collaborative team culture at the onset is crucial to high-performance, confident decision-making and proactive interaction. The values, beliefs, behaviors, and attitudes shared by the team will lead towards the successful delivery of the 2023 General Election.

We are all guided by the Electoral Commission's **TAUMATA** values of **Tūhonotanga** (bringing people together to increase participation in democracy), **Aratakina** (knowledge transfer - guiding towards greater understanding), **Uakaha** (being dynamic and energetic in what we do), **Manaakitanga** (demonstrating generosity and empowering people) and **Tika** (doing things right, doing the right things).

Each value is equally important and complements each other, and what it will look like in practice will evolve based on the professional and personal experiences of the team.

MAINTAIN CLEAR COMMUNICATION CHANNELS

Encourage open communication by providing a safe space where the team can share information in a transparent, honest and consistent manner.

- Combination of regular informal/formal meetings and get-togethers with team on all levels to update on work progress, share ideas, initiatives and raise concerns.
- Have an open-door policy for the Electorate leadership team.
- Task or assignment deadlines are clear and must be adhered to.
- Ask team for feedback followed by proper action, if necessary.
- Make the team aware of escalation process at an electorate level that will set boundaries and channels of decision-making in order to solve problems quickly and with clarity.

MANAGE TEAM AND INDIVIDUAL PERFORMANCE

Any team is only as strong as its weakest member. It is important to set everybody up for success and as Electorate Manager, my responsibilities to my team are:

- Stress importance of doing things right the first time and ensure processes are followed.
- Emphasize importance of accountability, traceability, and pride in work accomplishments.
- Identify where the gaps are in the team with regard to skillset to guide next steps in the recruitment of other team members.
- Encourage and support team to raise issues when mistakes happen, so it can be rectified, or its effects mitigated.
- Empower every member of the team so they can identify situations where they can exercise confident decision-making vs situations where they need to escalate issues.
- Inform, enforce, and monitor Health and Safety guidelines at Headquarters and out in the field it is everybody's responsibility.
- Identify individuals who can perform other roles in the lead up to the election period and for post-election activities.
- Celebrate every success however small or big they are.




6 Tamaki Makaurau

6.1 Overview

Turn-out rate	82.2%	65.12%	-18.23%

Tamaki Makaurau's voter turn-out in 2020 General Election is 65.12% and, with a rating of 72nd, is the lowest turn-out in the country.

As Tamaki Makaurau's boundaries cover 15 different general electorates in the Auckland and North region, the onus on how to improve participation rates fall on all Electorate Managers looking after these general electorates.



The number of special declaration votes processed in 2020 General Election was 5,527. With an increased effort in face-to-face community engagement and more presence at events for Maori Electoral Option and 2023 Enrolment Update Campaign (unable to organise or attend events in 2020 due to Covid-19 pandemic), it is expected that there will be no major increase in the number of special declaration votes this year. More electors, hopefully, will enrol and update their details in time for the print-out of the electoral rolls.



6.2 Logistics and Supplies

For 2023 General Election, the crucial part for Tamaki Makaurau is the logistical planning of movement and security of supplies and key voting materials during advance voting, election day and post-election periods.

Although the main bulk of the supplies will be coming directly from National Office to the headquarters of all general electorates, this is largely dependent on assumptions made during the planning of the voting service delivery. Any shortfall brought about by deviations from the electorate plan vs actual voting patterns will have to be managed from the Tamaki Makaurau Electorate Headquarters.

The Logistics and Supplies team will have to familiarise themselves with contact details and physical locations of electorate headquarters so that supply of additional voting materials will be fast and efficient. Clear communication channels must be established and finalised before the voting period.

Below is a list of risks that are unlikely to happen but if they do, may result to significant impacts.

- Loss of HQ or access to HQ due to natural disasters such as earthquake, widespread flooding, high winds, tsunami, etc
- Loss of HQ due to fire or localised flooding
- Threat to security of HQ when there is the potential for materials to be stolen or tampered with
- Threat to Security of HQ and voting places due to riots, protests, unruly members of the public or any other situation where there is a chance that staff may be evacuated
- Loss of Voting Place due to localised events such as fire, loss of power, loss of access to voting space, etc.
- A flood or incident closes a key road between the HQ and other HQs and key voting materials cannot be delivered (applicable to Tamaki Makaurau Electorate)

Other risks with a rating score of 12 or more on the risk register are:

- Recruitment (posed a significant risk to Manurewa Electorate in 2020)
 Not enough people apply to work or they drop-out before start of contract
 Quality of people applying for roles is not at the level required
 There are insufficient or poor quality applicants for the manager roles
- Increased COVID-19 cases in the community
 Loss of staff/replacements needed at HQ and voting places



8 Review

Subject	Feedback
Electorate Headquarters	 Headquarters was situated within the electorate, so it served the community well. Its location was very convenient for interviews, testing and training as well as for the HQ support team to provide assistance, as needed, to field staff during the advance voting and election day period. The farthest voting place was only less than 7km away. Configuration of the three parking spaces for EM and HQ Managers did not work at all, with the third car always blocking the two other cars. Also, there's very limited options for free parking for other staff, though, lots of option for paid full day parking around the area. The Headquarters was only an 8-min walk from Manukau train station and bus terminal. With careful planning, the rectangular layout and existing internal walls of the premises was fit for purpose and provided flexibility that catered well to the different stages of voting service delivery – from recruitment, bulk delivery, training, pick-up and return of supplies during election period and post-election activities.
Selection of voting services	 The final list of advance and election day voting places provided good coverage. Some selected voting places were already expected to be busier than the others due to location and how significant the venues are to the community. There were four open spaces / high foot traffic advance voting places – Westfield Manukau Mall, PAK'nSAVE Clendon, MIT Campus The Atrium and Southmall Manurewa. Except for PAK'nSAVE, all the other available spaces were generous, and planning of the layout was easy. Site contacts for voting places were very supportive. Even with the delays in responses and approvals from some, this did not delay the finalisation of the electorate plan. Venue hire costs were well within budget because some of the advance voting places lent their spaces for free as election event was seen as a community service.



	• The Manurewa Marae was used as a voting place for the first-time. This was an important step to improve on how we deliver services to Māori and to other hard-to-reach communities. Clendon Park, the area where the marae is located, had the lowest voter turnout in GE 2020.
	HQ operations would have been more efficient and effective at the onset if the Logistics & Supplies Manager (LSM) and the Recruitment & Rostering Manager (RRM) started employment at the same time i.e. 19 th June. The long hours and the stress that the RRM Team experienced to keep up with the recruitment needs of the team could have been avoided.
	• Introduction of the HQ Team Leader and HQ Senior Support roles worked well. Line of delegation provided HQ Managers opportunity to take time off as well as mentor good staff. For next election, the HQ Support Finance should be employed and trained earlier.
	• LSM and RRM spaces were clearly delineated (separated by the reception area) and it was easy to enforce and follow the restricted access policy.
HQ Operations	 Access to Level 1 via the stairs and lift was by swipe card only, hence, the security of staff and supplies were maintained and was never an issue. However, delivery became a major concern with NZ Post and their unwillingness to contact HQ to collect deliveries from them at ground floor. A limited access swipe card had to be provided to NZ Post delivery staff.
	• IT Access – the process came in too late and requests were already done a week prior. M36 process had to be redone for several staff which resulted to miscommunication, frustration and extra work.
	• The P&C and Security Advisors started out giving general rather than actionable replies to queries. What was needed were people who can dole out advice that can be easily converted into action points rather than "conceptual" answers. A more proactive approach from them from the get-go would have been better (which did happen eventually).
Recruitment	• Manurewa and Tamaki Makaurau RRM (Evonne was a first-time HQ Manager but had worked at a voting place in 2020 General Election. She was focused, hardworking and willing to go the extra mile to make sure deadlines are met and personnel issues resolved at a timely manner. She made sure that the attention and time of the R&R HQ Support team were directed towards tasks with the highest priority.



- "Register your Interest button vs APPLY button" at the bottom of webpage created confusing messages to interested candidates.
- SNAPHIRE went live three weeks before RRM was trained and ready to navigate the system. This meant that a high number of applications were already sitting on SNAPHIRE, but RRM was not ready and still without an HQ Support team. One of the first things RRM did was just to field queries from applicants who were following up on their applications, which was not the best use of her time.
- Application process was overly simplified with applicants given only two choices "to work at headquarters" or "to work at a voting place". A question on previous elections experience i.e. role and voting place/electorate would have made the process of shortlisting and interviewing for a suitable role much easier and faster.
- Feedback received was the job application was too generic if candidate knew beforehand what role they have applied and being interviewed for, they would prepare differently and used examples that suit the role better.
- SNAPHIRE allowed for candidates to apply in different electorates, and this caused a bit of confusion and extra administration time across several electorates. RRMs had the communication sorted out amongst them but worth highlighting as a future improvement. There should be a better method to filter, view and manage multiple applications from candidates.
- SNAPHIRE items for improvement (if will still be used as recruitment platform for 2026 General Election)
 - Drop down on child buckets why even give a list of all other roles when you are already on a specific child job. The step was confusing and created opportunity to make mistake.
 - There were too many steps for a two-week or a one-day job.
 - System did not allow for flexibility if recruiter or applicant change their minds except to issue a new contract.
 - Wordings on template letters need to be reviewed e.g. contracts said "feel free to contact me" but no contact details provided, and some letters just did not suit how communication at field level were structured.
 - Rehire process caused delays in appointing people to other roles.
- Group Interview was a good option as long as activities flow plan was in place to avoid for sessions to be overwhelming to HQ Support team and to candidates.



	 Interview notes - different scoring system for VPM+ but gave an option to select VPM should recruiter discover a gem during group interview. This meant that there is a discrepancy in interview scores as VPM scores out of 30 while group interview scores out of 25. If there was an audit or review, those who came through a group interview would look less qualified (lower score) than their VPM counterparts who were scored on a different rating system. One of our major successes was that voting teams reflected diversity and the demography of the area where voting places were located. With SNAPHIRE, most of the personnel documents were already electronically filed on the system. This made close of HQ easier with less paperwork to file, hence, less boxes to send to National Office.
	 Manurewa and Tamaki Makaurau LSM (George was an experienced HQ Manager, having done the role in 2017 and 2020 General Elections. He was always focused, had great attention to detail, delegated well to the team and prioritised tasks that would affect other tasks or the wider team. Daily/weekly goals were communicated beforehand, and the Logistics & Supplies HQ Support team were always aware of their responsibilities and accountabilities. Clear delegation was very important to ease the pressure on the team and ensure the success of task delivery on milestone dates. Split-shifts worked well to address the 15-hour days during the advance voting period.
Logistics and supplies	 An organised and tidy space with a smart layout contributed to the team's success. Restricted access policy for Zone 3 and Zone 4 was easy to follow mainly due to layout of the space and vigilance of the team. M46 corrections brought about by errors from National Office teams e.g. corrections on packing instructions (Panui Poti 28), electoral rolls not being automatically generated (Panui Poti 29), etc resulted to more HQ support hours. They needed to double-check packed supplies and make sure all boxes were complete before issue to field staff.
Training	The best trainers are the ones who have practical experience at voting places, whatever role it may have been. All Manurewa Trainers had voting place and HQ support/leadership experience - they were able to provide practical feedback to queries that came up during the training sessions.



	• Each Trainer had their own unique style of presentation. They were paired up based on their strengths and the kind of energy they can bring to the mix. Practice sessions delivered to the HQ team proved to be very beneficial for both trainers and staff.
	• There was value added with having one of the Trainers, Heather as a Regional Trainer. She had worked numerous times in senior leadership roles, and it was evident on how she conducted her training and answered questions – direct, practical and concise.
	• As a contingency plan, some of the administrative support staff were trained as training assistants. They were called upon to help during times when a rostered trainer became unavailable at the last minute.
	• Training content should allow for more exercises. For some voting staff, it is the repetition that encourages better understanding of the process. Election Night module for managers could have been done on a different day as the session became too long.
	 Briefing to the Voting Place Managers by the EM and LSM immediately after training provided clarity to what was covered during the session and reinforced what to expect moving forward. Some of the topics covered were: Factors unique to each voting place Tips and tricks of the role
	Support provided by HQ Team and levels of escalation
	 Security of staff, supplies and voting place Similarities/differences on the management of an advance and e-day voting places
	 Collection of supplies – when and what to expect
	Pack up and return of supplies
Rostering and communications	The HQ Support Team Leader (Emily) looked after rostering of voting place staff. The spreadsheet that was prepared earlier to record staff availability and preferences helped to weed out most of the avoidable problems or complications in the schedules.
	Rostering could have been simplified if issuing officers for Advance Voting Places were all OSIOs. This would have also provided more flexibility to the VP Manager with work allocation during busier periods.



	• EMS Rostering - "Copy staff from previous day" automatically copies staff but if there were extra roles (e.g. when needing to split a long day you have 4 staff of the same role splitting 2 duties), it did not copy the extra roles.
	• The dedicated phone line for staff to text in sick or late notice message was effective. A few HQ support person were trained on the step-by-step procedure.
Before Start of Voting Period	• It would have been helpful if it was clarified early on the part of the process that was looked after by National Office and the extent of their involvement in the planning and implementation of specific tasks plus timeline. Example - dealings with Westfield, PAK'nSAVE, The Warehouse, Maori Collective, etc.
	• Role of Voting Services Manager (Linden was vital to the success of the 13-day voting period. VSM made sure that information from LSM and EM on operations of voting places were successfully implemented in the field.
	• VSM was inducted and trained two weeks before the first day of advance voting. This was enough time to familiarise with the complexities of the voting service delivery.
	Ballot boxes and other key voting material were returned and collected at Manurewa HQ every day. It sounded a lot of hard work in theory, but once the voting team had established a pattern, it became much easier in practice.
Voting period	• The proximity of the headquarters to Westfield Manukau Mall voting place made it easy to support the voting team with their requests for additional staff and supplies.
voting period	Pop-up voting places were effective in bringing our services to targeted communities.
	• Community Liaisons assisted with enrolments at busy + complex locations such as Westfield Manukau Mall and at the men's/women's prisons.
	• As a first-time advance and election day voting place, Youthline Manukau did not perform as well as expected. However, it still brought in a good amount of votes and, hopefully, will be retained as a voting place for 2026. Additional election signages and parking directions might result to a higher voter turn-out in the future.
	• Manurewa Marae as a first-time voting place took in near to 3,600 votes (advance and election day), which was 385% more than the estimated votes.



	 The main HQ Support team were understanding and forward-thinking. They were able to put some safety measures in place to mitigate effects of problems out in the field and keep everybody on the right track.
	 For future improvement: Data entry from Power BI to Actual Votes - the order of voting places on Power BI should match with EMS actual votes page to decrease potential data entry errors. Add in option to export and print election day VP rosters and VP info only (separate from advance voting information) Refine job description of the Issuing Support Officer – aside from providing cover to the Voting Place Manager
	when required, they can also be relied upon to be an extra pair of eyes to check if other issuing officers were following the PIM diligently and consistently.
	 Timing of training for post-election activities which was the week before start of advance voting was ideal. Content could be improved by adding a section on completion steps i.e. tips on how to round off the whole process.
	 Coordination meetings were held between the EM, LSM, Post-Election Manager and Process Leaders in preparation for post-election activities. The team were consulted about staffing, process and room layout to make sure that they were happy with allocated resources (staff and supplies). Process Leaders organised their own supplies and arranged the layout of their allocated area even before post-election activities started.
Post-election and completion	 Early count was a high-pressure environment but was managed properly because staffing assumptions were correct and resources carefully prepared a few days in advance. A dedicated early count Assistant (HQ Support) was appointed and attended training with the Process Leader.
	 Selection of staff for different post-election activities was based on their skillset. People who were all-rounders and can float from the different post-election teams were identified to assist where needed.
	 An HQ Support Officer (Christopher took the initiative to be coordinator of special votes for both the general and Māori electorates. He became the main point of contact for incoming and outgoing SV docs and monitored progress of both teams. EM was updated with progress regularly, which made it easier to decide on how to share/move the resources between the teams.



Factors that contributed to additional costs, not included in the original budget:

- Timesheets and staff expense claim by Area Trainer paid via electorate budget.
- Roadshows, Train the Trainers sessions, briefings, presentations to National Office staff, etc at Headquarters additional HQ support required for set-up, other preparation work and clean-up.
- Delivery Issues hours spent on back & forth communication for follow-ups, driving to Grafton Office/NZ Post Box Lobbies to pick up deliveries.

Budget

- Additional HQ Support required for dress rehearsal, which also included briefings before the scheduled activity.
- HQ Senior Support was also assigned to assist with Tamaki Makaurau Supplies which included supervision of rolls and ballot paper checks.
- Panui Poti instruction on VPMA becomes VPMU then additional OSIO resulted to additional staff costs.
- Security provisions such as transport of voting materials (two staff at all times) and extra hours plus mileage expense incurred by voting team for overnight storage of key voting materials at Headquarters.
- Tamaki Makaurau judicial recount with around 40 HQ Support staff required for two days.

RESPONSE TO LETTER

Thank you for your email dated 5 June 2024.

We have previously looked into potential breaches of the Electoral Act relating to activities at Manurewa Marae. These were about whether those activities at the Marae during the election should be considered treating. The concerns you have outlined are about earlier activity and whether there was pressure for people to change electoral rolls. In this response, we will provide information on our inquiries to date, and a response to your questions regarding treating and bribery and encouraging people to enrol on the Māori roll.

The Manurewa Marae was identified by the Electoral Commission along with other local marae including Papakura, Ruapōtaka, and Ōrākei Marae as a potential venue that members of the surrounding community would readily vote in. It was noted that Manurewa Marae had recently offered COVID-19 vaccinations and opportunities to participate in the Census. It is used by the Ministry of Social Development to promote employment opportunities. It is also used as a community hub by virtue of its medical services and food bank.

In our discussions with the marae, it was mentioned that they might provide kai and or activities to create a family friendly environment around the voting place. We were clear that the opportunity to receive kai or participate in the activities must be available to anyone coming to the marae and cannot be dependent on people voting. It is not uncommon for schools or other community organisations to host activities around voting places on this basis.

The marae was advertised as a voting place issuing votes for the Manurewa general electorate and the Tāmaki Makaurau Māori electorate and like all voting places, it also issued special votes for all general and Māori electorates across the country.

Under section 217 of the Electoral Act, anyone who gives or provides food, drink, entertainment or provision is liable for prosecution for the corrupt practice of treating, if done "for the purpose of corruptly" influencing that person to, generally put, alter their voting behaviour or procure the defendant's election.

Although the ambit is broad, the threshold for establishing treating is also high - a corrupt intention is required. The Courts have previously held that the offence of "treating" requires an intention on the part of the person treating to influence the votes of the persons treated.



In this case, it appears that the marae was publicly offering kai and entertainment alongside a whole range of organised marae activities including whanau day, kapa haka day, health checks, employment expo, and the Electoral Commission's voting place.

When we looked into the matter in 2023 it appeared that food was being made generally available without reference to voting or voting for Te Pāti Māori or its candidate. There did not appear to be any overt campaigning associated with the provision of food.

Based on the information we have, we do not consider that this would meet the high test for treating and have not referred the matter to Police.

Māori choose the general roll or the Māori roll when they first enrol to vote. People can change the roll type they are on at any time, except in the three months before a general election, in the three months before local elections which are held every three years, and before a parliamentary by-election if the change would move you into the electorate where the by-election is being held. The choice is up to each individual elector.

The roll choice affects which candidates an elector can choose from in parliamentary elections and local elections. A person that chooses the Māori roll, will vote for a candidate in the Māori electorate they live in. A person that chooses the general roll, will vote for a candidate in the general electorate they live in. They will vote for the same list of political parties in a general election, whichever roll they choose to be on. If they choose the Māori roll, and their local council has a Māori ward or constituency, they will vote for candidates in the Māori ward or constituency. If they choose the general roll, they will vote for candidates in the general ward or constituency.

The Māori Electoral Option choice also helps determine the number of Māori and general electorates in future elections. The number of Māori on the general and Māori rolls, together with the results of the census, are used to work out the number of general and Māori electorates. The number of Māori enrolled on the Māori roll could mean the number of Māori electorates increases, decreases, or stays the same for future elections. In accordance with the Electoral Act, the Electoral Commission provided the number of Māori enrolled on the Māori and general rolls on 1 April 2024 to Stats NZ. Stats NZ will be calculating the number of electorates for the 2026 General Election. The Representation Commission will then review the names and boundaries of the electorates.

From 31 March to 13 July 2023, around the same time as the census, the Electoral Commission had an awareness campaign underway about the legislative changes to the Māori Electoral Option that came into force on 31 March 2023 and the period Māori electors could choose to change roll types prior to the general election. Information provided by the Electoral Commission is neutral and emphasises that it is an individual's choice.

Encouraging or persuading an elector of Māori descent to enrol on the Māori roll versus the general roll or to switch from one to another would not be appropriate for an electoral official and would be contrary to the Electoral Commission's code of conduct. However, it is not an offence under the Electoral Act for a person or organisation to encourage or persuade a person of Māori descent as to which roll type they should choose. Enrolment forms are publicly available and community groups and political parties and candidates can request copies of the forms and encourage people to enrol (Order resources | Elections).



The Commission's assessment is that encouraging people to enrol on the Māori roll does not constitute bribery or treating on the basis the elector would be eligible to vote in an electorate that the party and/or candidate is contesting. More would be required; under the Electoral Act treating or bribery must have a corrupt intent and be more closely related to influencing voting for a party or candidate. The information the Commission has received to date is not sufficient to establish this.

The Commission will reconsider any matter if any new information is provided. We understand that a number of complaints have recently been made to Police and other agencies that are currently being looked into. The Electoral Commission will provide any assistance requested by those agencies and consider any new information that they make available regarding electoral matters, but will not comment further while those investigations are being undertaken.



The Commission is responsible for administering the requirements in the Electoral Act for parties and candidates to record and disclose donations and loans.

The Commission only holds information about donations and loans to parties or candidates disclosed under the Electoral Act. The legislation sets out the details that parties and candidates are required to disclose.

Parties file annual returns of donations and loans, and returns within 10 working days of donations exceeding \$20,000 and loans exceeding \$30,000 and candidates file returns after each election. All returns are made publicly available online here, and here. You have also asked for confirmation that the Waipareira Trust has ceased making political donations. All donations are made publicly available here, and, as you can also find this information online your request is refused under s 18(d) of the OIA.

Please note that donations or loans relating to local elections are not reported to the Electoral Commission, as we are only responsible for parliamentary elections.



Question 1

I saw Takutai Moana Kemp near the entrance to the voting place when I visited on 5th Oct at 11am to check on the team. She definitely was not there to vote and she stayed for a few minutes (I believe she left when she saw me). I personally did not see her interact with people who accepted the offer of food and drinks within the 10m buffer zone.

As for the other days, I did not receive any written or verbal reports from my voting place team nor from my mobile support on this matter.

There is another location within the Manurewa Marae premises where they offer food and drinks to the community. This was approximately 30m away from the voting place and too far away for my team to see whether Takutai Moana Kemp stayed/lingered at that spot. I believe the food was offered to everybody whether they have voted or not.

Question 2

There were no Te Pāti Māori officials employed or involved in any way in the running of the voting place.

Also, none of the voting team were actually staff from the marae. My team were people that volunteer there and have employment outside the marae. One other person, who only worked on election day, is on the Board of Trustees for the marae but also is employed outside of it.

Good afternoon

Here is our response to the request.

2. Were any te Party Maori officials employed or involved in any way in the running of this booth other than as an official scrutineers and if so who were they and what role did they play?

It is not possible to give a 100% definitive answer to this question. However, we ask all applicants who register their interest to work for the Commission if they have any affiliation with any political party and if there are any conflicts of interest that they need to declare. We also ask the same when doing reference checks. If anything is raised here, we will follow up to the point of getting legal advice if we should or could employ someone who answered positively to these questions. Based on these checks we can say that we did not employ anyone form Te Party Māori and that no one who worked at that booth other than Scrutineers were associated with any political party.

All RRMs have finished their employment of the Commission and we do not have a 100% accurate record of who specifically worked at which booth.

I trust this information would be sufficient to respond to the OIA. The only other way of trying to find out would be to have a list of the names of all te Party Māori officials to cross reference it to whom applied and were appointed to positions in the whole electorate. After this we may have to look at where individual employees may have been deployed. This would be a significant piece of work.

REQUEST TO INVESTIGATE POTENTIAL BREACHES OF ELECTORAL ACT 1993

Tēnā koe Karl,

- I write in relation to the recent reporting in the media about the potential misuse of census data centred around a contract held by the Whānau Ora Commissioning Agency and Manurewa Marae. As you will know, Stats NZ have already announced they are investigating the matter and a complaint has been made to the police.
- There are allegations in the article concerning the offering of food, drink and vouchers by Manurewa Marae to induce electors to switch from the General electoral roll to the Māori electoral roll:

Visitors to the marae last year were also given \$100 supermarket vouchers when they completed the forms to switch rolls.

•••

Throughout the year, staff say were repeatedly drilled to get marae visitors and clients to switch rolls. "The directive was continuous. Every time we had morning debriefs, it would come up."

...

The marae staffed a dedicated desk for visitors to fill out the enrolment form, the exemployee said. "The vocab they were told to use was basically: 'Sign this, or you can't get that.'

"They would say: 'Tick that box ... to change rolls, and then we can give you your voucher'.

"To me they were using a community that was already in poverty, using the food and that so they will come in. They knew that they'd come in because they'd get vouchers and free coffee and ice-cream.

"A lot of people came. We were overrun."

3 John Tamihere, on behalf of the Whānau Ora Commissioning Agency responded to the allegations, per the article:

"It would be pretty stupid not to put both together, wouldn't it? Well, that's what occurred," Tamihere said. "Our civic duty to our people is to alert them to both.

"When we do relationships with our people and they come to our maraes, we either provide kai or kai manaaki packaging. You call it an inducement, we call it maanaaki.

4 And also:

Tamihere also denied Te Pāti Māori leaflets were included in support packages. "Free kai, coffee and ice creams for babies were provided by the marae to maanaaki our whānau as a form of 'treating'.

- 5 I am concerned by Mr Tamihere's admission of 'treating'.
- I am writing to ask you to investigate this matter further in your role as chief electoral officer to ascertain if any corrupt or illegal practices have been committed under the Electoral Act 1993 (the **Act**) in the lead up to the 2023 General Election, especially either bribery or treating.
- We note these matters are new and additional to the previous issues raised with the Commission in relation to Manurewa Marae.²

Tāmaki Makaurau Māori electorate - 2023 General Election


- This is especially important given the events described, centred around Manurewa Marae, took place in the Tāmaki Makaurau Māori electorate.
- Takutai Tarsh Kemp was the chief executive of Manurewa Marae at the time the alleged inducements occurred and only stood down from this role after winning the Tāmaki Makaurau Māori electorate in the 2023 General Election post 3 November 2023 when the official results were declared. She announced her candidacy for the election in February 2023, before the census took place.
- In the 2023 General Election, Takutai Tarsh Kemp for Te Pati Māori won the Tāmaki Makaurau Māori electorate, over Peeni Henare of Labour by a very slim margin of 42 votes.
- This was the closest result in any Māori electorate in the 2023 General Election and if the matters set out above did breach the Act they may very likely have also influenced the result in that electorate.

Potential Breaches of the Electoral Act 1993

An elector changing their registration between the General and Māori electoral districts became possible through the exercise of the "Māori option" introduced into the Act by the Electoral (Māori Electoral Option) Legislation Act 2022 which came into force on 31 March 2023.

- 13 It appears from the article that certain persons, on behalf of Manurewa Marae, run by one of the candidates in the election, gave incentives to electors in the form of food, drink and vouchers of monetary value to induce them to switch from the general electorate roll to the Māori electorate roll.
- 14 The Chief Executive of the Marae was standing in the relevant *Māori* electorate and so this switching of rolls effectively made them into electors eligible to vote for her.
- 15 It appears these actions constitute bribery under s 216 of the Act or treating under s 217 of the Act.
- Both bribery and treating involve inducing of voters to vote or refrain from voting. The effect of switching between electorates effectively means that person will no longer be able to vote for the relevant general electorate but only be eligible to vote in the Māori electorate.

RESPONSE TO LETTER		

Thank you for your letter dated 4 June 2024.

Kia ora

We have previously looked into potential breaches of the Electoral Act relating to activities at Manurewa Marae. These were about whether those activities at the Marae during the election should be considered treating. The concerns you have outlined are about earlier activity and whether there was pressure for people to change electoral rolls. In this response, we will provide information on our inquiries to date, and a response to your questions regarding treating and bribery and encouraging people to enrol on the Māori roll.

The Manurewa Marae was identified by the Electoral Commission along with other local marae including Papakura, Ruapōtaka, and Ōrākei Marae as a potential venue that members of the surrounding community would readily vote in. It was noted that Manurewa Marae had recently offered COVID-19 vaccinations and opportunities to participate in the Census. It is used by the Ministry of Social Development to promote employment opportunities. It is also used as a community hub by virtue of its medical services and food bank.

In our discussions with the marae, it was mentioned that they might provide kai and or activities to create a family friendly environment around the voting place. We were clear that the opportunity to receive kai or participate in the activities must be available to anyone coming to the marae and cannot be dependent on people voting. It is not uncommon for schools or other community organisations to host activities around voting places on this basis.

The marae was advertised as a voting place issuing votes for the Manurewa general electorate and the Tāmaki Makaurau Māori electorate and like all voting places, it also issued special votes for all general and Māori electorates across the country.

Under section 217 of the Electoral Act, anyone who gives or provides food, drink, entertainment or provision is liable for prosecution for the corrupt practice of treating, if done "for the purpose of corruptly" influencing that person to, generally put, alter their voting behaviour or procure the defendant's election.



Although the ambit is broad, the threshold for establishing treating is also high - a corrupt intention is required. The Courts have previously held that the offence of "treating" requires an intention on the part of the person treating to influence the votes of the persons treated.

In this case, it appears that the marae was publicly offering kai and entertainment alongside a whole range of organised marae activities including whanau day, kapa haka day, health checks, employment expo, and the Electoral Commission's voting place.

When we looked into the matter in 2023 it appeared that food was being made generally available without reference to voting or voting for Te Pāti Māori or its candidate. There did not appear to be any overt campaigning associated with the provision of food.

Based on the information we have, we do not consider that this would meet the high test for treating and have not referred the matter to Police.

Māori choose the general roll or the Māori roll when they first enrol to vote. People can change the roll type they are on at any time, except in the three months before a general election, in the three months before local elections which are held every three years, and before a parliamentary by-election if the change would move you into the electorate where the by-election is being held. The choice is up to each individual elector.

The roll choice affects which candidates an elector can choose from in parliamentary elections and local elections. A person that chooses the Māori roll, will vote for a candidate in the Māori electorate they live in. A person that chooses the general roll, will vote for a candidate in the general electorate they live in. They will vote for the same list of political parties in a general election, whichever roll they choose to be on. If they choose the Māori roll, and their local council has a Māori ward or constituency, they will vote for candidates in the Māori ward or constituency. If they choose the general roll, they will vote for candidates in the general ward or constituency.

The Māori Electoral Option choice also helps determine the number of Māori and general electorates in future elections. The number of Māori on the general and Māori rolls, together with the results of the census, are used to work out the number of general and Māori electorates. The number of Māori enrolled on the Māori roll could mean the number of Māori electorates increases, decreases, or stays the same for future elections. In accordance with the Electoral Act, the Electoral Commission provided the number of Māori enrolled on the Māori and general rolls on 1 April 2024 to Stats NZ. Stats NZ will be calculating the number of electorates for the 2026 General Election. The Representation Commission will then review the names and boundaries of the electorates.

From 31 March to 13 July 2023, around the same time as the census, the Electoral Commission had an awareness campaign underway about the legislative changes to the Māori Electoral Option that came into force on 31 March 2023 and the period Māori electors could choose to change roll types prior to the general election. Information provided by the Electoral Commission is neutral and emphasises that it is an individual's choice.

Encouraging or persuading an elector of Māori descent to enrol on the Māori roll versus the general roll or to switch from one to another would not be appropriate for an electoral official and would be contrary to the Electoral Commission's code of conduct. However, it is not an offence under the



Electoral Act for a person or organisation to encourage or persuade a person of Māori descent as to which roll type they should choose. Enrolment forms are publicly available and community groups and political parties and candidates can request copies of the forms and encourage people to enrol (Order resources | Elections).

The Commission's assessment is that encouraging people to enrol on the Māori roll does not constitute bribery or treating on the basis the elector would be eligible to vote in an electorate that the party and/or candidate is contesting. More would be required; under the Electoral Act treating or bribery must have a corrupt intent and be more closely related to influencing voting for a party or candidate. The information the Commission has received to date is not sufficient to establish this.

The Commission will reconsider any matter if any new information is provided. We understand that a number of complaints have recently been made to Police and other agencies that are currently being looked into. The Electoral Commission will provide any assistance requested by those agencies and consider any new information that they make available regarding electoral matters, but will not comment further while those investigations are being undertaken.

Thank you for getting in touch with the Commission to raise your concerns with us.

TE PĀTI MĀORI SIGNS UP ON ELECTION DAY

On election day for the 2023 General Election we contacted you regarding complaints about a number of Te Pāti Māori signs and billboards, some of which also featured Te Pāti Māori candidates, that remained up on election day contrary to the requirements in <u>section 197</u> of the Electoral Act 1993 (the Act). There is no breach of section 197 provided the display of election advertising on election day is inadvertent, and steps are taken to cover or remove the signage when notified by the Commission.

Our records show your campaign team took prompt action to remove a number of signs that had been left up on election day. However, we do not appear to have received confirmation as to what action was taken to remove Te Pāti Māori signs in the following locations:

- Signs at Sandstone Road, Whitford, 2576, 150 and 176 Taharepa Road, Tauhara and 33 Elizabeth Street, Taupō – email to you at 1.50pm
- State Highway 2 on fence of 180 Chapel Street, Masterton we also received a complaint giving the address as 180 Church Street, Masterton, which was communicated to you at 11.40am
- 262 Opawa Road, Hillsborough, Christchurch email to you at 4.47pm
- State Highway 35 heading towards Raglan, just before Te Uku email to you at 5.01pm

Please can you confirm whether you have any record of these signs being removed, including the time they were taken down. We appreciate the efforts taken to remove signage that was inadvertently on display on election day. For future elections, it would be helpful if you ensure your campaign team has good records of where signs are put up to ensure all election hoardings are removed by midnight on the day before election day.

Finally, on a related matter it was brought to our attention Te Pāti Māori flags were set up at the entrance to Auckland Botanical Gardens, Manurewa at approximately 6.30pm, for your election night event. The rules in the Electoral Act prohibit the display of this type of material featuring a party name or logo before the polls close at 7pm. For future events, please ensure these types of items are not on public display until after 7pm on election night.

We have had reports from voters saying they felt incredibly intimidated and pressured when trying to cast their vote. - Free Kai at the Manurewa Marae My site contact at the Manurewa Marae, Hilda confirmed that they are providing kai to anyone who comes to the voting place and this is not conditional on whether they have voted or not. Her reply was "We provide manaakitanga for anyone who comes to the marae whether they vote or not."
- Incident at Westfield Manukau Mall The incident was reported to me by my mobile support team and I quickly went to Westfield Manukau to check on our staff and the voting place. Te Pati Maori has just left by then but the Voting Place Manager explained what happened. Te Pati Maori positioned themselves at a location on the mezzanine level which was clearly outside the 10m buffer zone. There was one voter who complained to the Voting Place Manager and she had to explain the 10m buffer zone.

I also received an email from , at 7pm tonight.

"I wanted to flag an incident that occurred in Centre today at Westfield Manukau.

The Maori Party came to the Centre and performed a few songs on our Level 1 mezzanine that is directly overlooking the election voting site. We did not approve this and asked them to leave, but they refused to listen to Security. They left after about 5-10 minutes.

Those who attended have posted the performance on social media, and some people in the Centre filmed and have done so as well. This performance could be heard on the other side of the Centre (i.e. JD sport).

Due to this performance, we have had calls from customers that were heated calling us "disgusting," that the event was "incredibly intimidating" and that they will "never come back to Westfield Manukau."

In our discussions with the marae, it was mentioned that they might provide kai and or activities to create a family friendly environment around the voting place. We were clear that the opportunity to receive kai or participate in the activities must be available to anyone coming to the marae and cannot be dependent on people voting. It is not uncommon for a schools or other community organisations to host activities around voting places on this basis.

On 3 October, we were first made aware that the Manurewa Marae was making an association, via a social media post, between voting at the marae and receiving a free hangi. The Electorate Manager contacted the marae management, on the same day, to make it clear that the hangi (or any other

incentive) cannot be tied to having voted but should be available to everyone whether they have voted or not. They were asked to amend their posts to reflect this. We received confirmation from our contact at the marae that they are providing kai to anyone who comes to the voting place, and this is not conditional on whether they have voted or not.

With regard to the incident at Westfield Manukau Mall, the Commission first became aware of the incident via an enquiry on social media. It was quickly ascertained that the gathering of Te Pati Māori supporters was outside the 10m buffer zone and this was communicated to the complainant. Nevertheless, we also asked the Electorate Manager to look into incident and liaise with her voting place manager.

The Electorate Manager advised that the incident was reported to her by her mobile support team. The Electorate Manager quickly went to Westfield Manukau to check on our staff and the voting place. Te Pati Māori had just left by then, but the Voting Place Manager explained what happened. The Voting Place Manager advised that Te Pati Māori positioned themselves at a location on the mezzanine level above which was clearly outside the 10m buffer zone. There was one voter who complained to the Voting Place Manager and the 10m buffer zone rules were explained. The Electorate Manager was also contacted by the Westfield Mall manager as the mall had received complaints about the incident.

While the incident may have upset some customers in the mall, it was outside the 10m buffer zone and voting continued. Accordingly, we will not be taking the matter further.

The Electorate Manager advised that the incident was reported to her by her mobile support team. The Electorate Manager quickly went to Westfield Manukau to check on our staff and the voting place. Te Pati Māori had just left by then, but the Voting Place Manager explained what happened. The Voting

Place Manager advised that Te Pati Māori positioned themselves at a location on the mezzanine level above which was clearly outside the 10m buffer zone. There was one voter who complained to the Voting Place Manager and the 10m buffer zone rules were explained. The Electorate Manager was also contacted by the Westfield Mall manager as the mall had received complaints about the incident.

While the incident may have upset some customers in the mall, it was outside the 10m buffer zone and voting continued. Accordingly, we will not be taking the matter further.



Today, the Te Pāti Māori candidate for Tāmaki Makaurau has posted a live Facebook video showing Te Pāti Māori singing waiata next to the polling booth located in the food court at Manukau's Westfield Mall. See here: https://www.facebook.com/takutaikemp/videos/251564444115170/? mibextid=zDhOQc

We have had reports from voters saying they felt incredibly intimidated and pressured when trying to cast their vote. They also felt like they were being 'watched over from above' as they tried to cast an anonymous vote. This surely can not be legal, and why have the EC and Police not already shut this down?

Encouraging Māori voters to vote with Kaupapa Māori polling booths and the like, can not be in favour of any one Māori-aligned party, nor can it be at the expense of true democracy.

Census Data Violation:

Previous employees of Manurewa Marae have reported illegal actions by Manurewa Marae who were commissioned to collect data for the Census. When collecting census data, Te Pāti Māori supporters took a copy of the census form data for their political party database. They also signed up non-voters and retained this data as well. They encouraged all Māori they engaged with for the purposes of the census, to vote Te Pāti Māori. Te Pāti Māori also directed Census funding towards their political parties' promotional activities. The EC have failed to act on any of these reports from the general public and they've now raised these concerns with us.

I expect a response from EC and the Police before the close of business today please to ensure that this type of illegal activity is shut down today, and I also expect Te Pāti Māori's activity to date to be heavily prosecuted. We would also like to see Takutai Trash Kemp disqualified from this election.

Inaction by EC and the Police in a strong and immediate manner will leave us with no choice but to take this matter public on Freedoms NZ and Brian Tamaki's social media channels and also to mainstream media.

I'm writing regarding the complaint I made on 1 November regarding treating at the Manurewa marae. I wish to provide further information to the Commission in its consideration of that complaint; bring the your attention to an additional irregularity we'd like the Commission to consider; and make a request as to the timing of the Commission's decision on whether or not to pass these complaints to the police.

Additional information

1. I note some of the Manurewa marae's Facebook live videos appear to have been removed from their Facebook page as at today. I don't know why that might have happened. I understand the Commission may already have downloaded copies of those videos, but we also have copies if needed.

2. Some of the marae's Facebook content, however, has not been deleted as yet, i'd like to bring the Commission's attention to further evidence suggesting the purpose of Manurewa marae's activity was to

In a Facebook Live video on 13 October, the marae said:

- It was up to "Activation 11" in a programme of 12 activations (the last one to take place on 14 October, which included a free concert and 1,000 free hangi among other things at the marae)
 - In our view, the fact that this programme was titled as "activations" indicates clearly the purpose of the programme, namely to "activate" people who might not otherwise be active into voting, using the lure of free things to encourage them. Indeed, in this video the free offerings are collectively referred to as the "activations" which even more clearly indicates their purpose. This is important because the marae's intent is an important element of the treating offence.

 - The number and timing of the activations also closely coincide with the period where voting was open with the election, which is a further indication of the programme's intent.
 The advertising of "activation 12" on election day, which involves 1,000 free hangi and a free concert at a polling booth location, alongside an encouragement to vote at that polling booth, is also treating.

In a Facebook post on 2 October, the marae says:

Come on down to the Marae apopo (tomorrow) for our RANGATAHI ACTIVATION. A packed full day of Magic and greatness.

We have HIP HOP CLASSES, KARAOKE and much more. Our VOTING station is also open for our whanau over 18 who need to VOTE.

Happening tomorrow Tuesday 3 October from 10AM till 4PM at our Marae.

!!!!!! HANGI, COFFEE, ICE CREAM, HOT DONUTS AND HAIRCUTS.

Share with your whanau and come on down!!!

#ManurewaMarae #Rangatahi #Voting

- This post shows that the hours when free things are available at the marae during the 3 October "Activation" are timed to precisely coincide with the hours when the polling booth at the marae was open Further, the post contains a dear link between casting a ballot and obtaining free hip hop classes, karaoke, hangi, coffee, ice cream, donuts, and haircuts, which is treating,
 - This link between voting and freebies is, of course, made even more explicit in the Facebook Live video the following morning which I shared with the Commission previously that outlined a ticketing system the marae used to provide free items specifically for people who cast a ballot at the polling booth located at the marae.

3. Now that the final results have been declared, it is clear that the scale of the potential treating (which the marae itself says runs to thousands of people) is significant enough to affect the election result, where the final margin is four votes. This scale, relative to the margin in the election, makes it even more imperative that this treating is investigated by police

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As you know, a leadine of 1 December to file any electoral petition in relation to Tamaki Makaurau. It would be deeply unjust if that deadline were to pass without all parties knowing the Commission's decision on whether or not to forward these complaints to the police, as that decision may be relevant to any electoral petition.

Our firm view is that it is the responsibility of state agencies, rather than other parties, to pursue potentially corrupt practices in elections, and we ask that the Commission address that responsibility in a timely fashion. We therefore request that the Commission expedite its decision on these matters, and release that decision well in advance of the legal deadline of 1 December for filling any electoral petitions. I also request an update on the Commission's intentions about when it will make a decision, so I can pass that information on to decision-makers within

We have looked into the matters you have raised in your emails of 1 and 8 November 2023, including the videos, relating to Manurewa Marae.

The Electoral Commission works to make voting accessible to all communities and to increasing participation within communities that have lower rates of engagement in the electoral process. In selecting voting places, it engages with people in different locations, particularly where voter turnout is low, to understand which potential venues will work for different communities. Following this, a formal assessment is done of each site to ensure it meets the Commission's requirements.

The Manurewa Marae was identified along with other local marae including Papakura, Ruapōtaka, and Ōrākei Marae as a potential venue that members of the surrounding community would readily vote in. It was noted that it had recently offered COVID-19 vaccinations and opportunities to participate in the Census. It is used by the Ministry of Social Development to promote employment opportunities. It is also used as a community hub by virtue of its medical services and food bank.

In our discussions with the marae, it was mentioned that they might provide kai and or activities to create a family friendly environment around the voting place. We were clear that the opportunity to receive kai or participate in the activities must be available to anyone coming to the marae and cannot be dependent on people voting. It is not uncommon for schools or other community organisations to host activities around voting places on this basis.

We were aware of the candidate's involvement at the marae. Prior to agreeing to use the venue we agreed that the candidate would not enter the voting place other than to vote herself. We were provided an alternative designated contact person that we made the arrangements with. We also ensured that the marae personnel were aware of the rules regarding election advertising. Electoral Commission staff made sure that the 10 metre advance voting place buffer zone and the election day rules were strictly being observed with respect to the voting place.

On 3 October, we were first made aware of a social media post by the Manurewa Marae promoting a free hangi after people voted. The Electorate Manager contacted the marae contact person, on 4 October, to make it clear that the hangi (or any other incentive) cannot be tied to having voted but

should be available to everyone whether they have voted or not. They were asked to amend their posts to reflect this. We received confirmation from our contact at the marae that they were providing kai to anyone who came to the voting place, and this was not conditional on whether or not they had voted. When the Electoral Commission's Acting Chair and Deputy Chief Executive Operations visited the marae on 5 October 2023, this is what they also observed.

On 9 October, the Commission received a further complaint, that was also copied to Police, regarding a social media post by an individual which linked voting for Te Pāti Māori to receiving kai at the Manurewa Marae. The Electorate Manager contacted the marae again to check. The marae confirmed again that they were providing kai to anyone who came to the marae, and this was not conditional on whether they had voted or not and not linked to voting for any particular party.

Under <u>section 217</u> of the Electoral Act, anyone who gives or provides food, drink, entertainment or provision is liable for prosecution for the corrupt practice of treating, if done "for the purpose of corruptly" influencing that person to, generally put, alter their voting behaviour or procure the defendant's election.

Although the ambit is broad, the threshold for establishing treating is also high - a corrupt intention is required. The Courts have previously held that the offence of "treating" requires an intention on the part of the person treating to influence the votes of the persons treated.

In this case, it appears that the marae was offering kai and entertainment alongside a whole range of organised marae activities including whanau day, kapa haka day, health checks, employment expo, and the Electoral Commission's voting place.

It appears that food was being made generally available without reference to voting or voting for Te Pāti Māori or its candidate. Nor was it being accompanied by the giving out of campaign material.

Based on the information we have, we do not consider that this would meet the high test for treating and would not refer the matter to Police.

In the case of this marae, to avoid any perception this activity could amount to treating we were in touch with those involved to advise the hangi should be available to everyone, whether or not they had voted. After the initial suggestion it was linked to voting, we were satisfied this was rectified and attended the venue to confirm this. The wider marae venue had other events on at the same time, and we are advised the 10 metre 'buffer zone' around the voting place was observed.

Thank you for your email.

Treating is giving or providing food, drink, entertainment or provision to any person with the intention of corruptly influencing their vote and is a criminal offence under section 217 of the Electoral Act 1993. Although the ambit is broad, the threshold for establishing treating is also high - a corrupt intention is required. The Courts have previously held that the offence of "treating" requires an intention on the part of the person treating to influence the votes of the persons treated. The question of intention is an inference of fact which the Court has to draw.

The post you have complained about appears to be encouraging people to vote, but could be interpreted that they will only receive a hangi conditional on voting. To avoid any perception this activity could amount to treating we have contacted the marae to advise the hangi should be available to everyone, whether or not they have voted.

We have looked into the matters you have raised relating to Manurewa Marae.

The Manurewa Marae was identified by the Electoral Commission along with other local marae including Papakura, Ruapōtaka, and Ōrākei Marae as a potential venue that members of the surrounding community would readily vote in. It was noted that it had recently offered COVID-19 vaccinations and opportunities to participate in the Census. It is used by the Ministry of Social Development to promote employment opportunities. It is also used as a community hub by virtue of its medical services and food bank.

In our discussions with the marae, it was mentioned that they might provide kai and or activities to create a family friendly environment around the voting place. We were clear that the opportunity to receive kai or participate in the activities must be available to anyone coming to the marae and cannot be dependent on people voting. It is not uncommon for schools or other community organisations to host activities around voting places on this basis.

The marae was advertised as a voting place issuing votes for the Manurewa general electorate and the Tāmaki Makaurau Māori electorate and like all voting places, it also issued special votes for all general and Māori electorates across the country.

We were aware of a candidate's involvement at the marae. Prior to agreeing to use the venue we agreed that the candidate would not enter the voting place other than to vote. We were provided an alternative designated contact person that we made the arrangements with. We also ensured that the marae personnel were aware of the rules regarding election advertising. Electoral Commission staff made sure that the 10 metre advance voting place buffer zone and the election day rules were strictly being observed with respect to the voting place.

Under the Electoral Act, during the advance voting period, election advertising and branding can be displayed as long as it is not within 10 metres of the entrance to the place where votes are actually being issued. The entrance to the marae and the area where kai and activities were being offered was separated from and much more than 10 metres away from the area designated as the voting place.

The Electoral Commission was responsible for appointing and training the voting place staff. We set clear expectations that they must work in a way that supports a free and fair election. We have a code of conduct that sets that out, including being politically neutral.

On 3 October, we were first made aware of a social media post by the Manurewa Marae promoting a free hangi after people voted. The Electorate Manager contacted the marae contact person, on 4 October, to make it clear that the hangi (or any other food or entertainment) cannot be tied to having voted but should be available to everyone whether they have voted or

not. They were asked to amend their posts to reflect this. We received confirmation from our contact at the marae that they were providing kai to anyone who came to the voting place, and this was not conditional on whether or not they had voted. When the Electoral Commission's Acting Chair and Deputy Chief Executive Operations visited the marae on 5 October 2023, this is what they also observed.

On 9 October, the Commission received a further complaint, that was also copied to Police, regarding a social media post made not by the marae but by another individual which linked voting for Te Pāti Māori to receiving kai at the Manurewa Marae. The Electorate Manager contacted the marae again to check. The marae confirmed again that they were providing kai to anyone who came to the marae, and this was not conditional on whether they had voted or not and not linked to voting for any particular party.

Under <u>section 217</u> of the Electoral Act, anyone who gives or provides food, drink, entertainment or provision is liable for prosecution for the corrupt practice of treating, if done "for the purpose of corruptly" influencing that person to, generally put, alter their voting behaviour or procure the defendant's election.

Although the ambit is broad, the threshold for establishing treating is also high - a corrupt intention is required. The Courts have previously held that the offence of "treating" requires an intention on the part of the person treating to influence the votes of the persons treated.

In this case, it appears that the marae was publicly offering kai and entertainment alongside a whole range of organised marae activities including whanau day, kapa haka day, health checks, employment expo, and the Electoral Commission's voting place.

It appears that food was being made generally available without reference to voting or voting for Te Pāti Māori or its candidate. Small scale giveaways such as a beanie are not sufficient to meet the test for treating. There did not appear to be any overt campaigning associated with the manaakitanga.

Based on the information we have, we do not consider that this would meet the high test for treating and have not referred the matter to Police.

There have been complaints about the playing of the song 'Proud to be Māori/ 'You're Magic', composed by Matua Dave Para in 1984, on election day. In the Commission's view, this song and the message it is promoting are not exclusively campaign related. It is associated with a broader range of activities promoted at the marae, celebrating maori identity and achievements, and instilling a sense of pride into Māori communities. In our view, the playing of the song did not breach the election day rules.

The Electoral Commission was responsible for appointing and training the voting place staff. We set clear expectations that they must work in a way that supports a free and fair election. We have a code of conduct that sets that out, including being politically neutral.

On 3 October, we were first made aware of a social media post by the Manurewa Marae promoting a free hangi after people voted. The Electorate Manager contacted the marae contact person, on 4 October, to make it clear that the hangi (or any other food or entertainment) cannot be tied to having voted but should be available to everyone whether they have voted or

not. They were asked to amend their posts to reflect this. We received confirmation from our contact at the marae that they were providing kai to anyone who came to the voting place, and this was not conditional on whether or not they had voted. When the Electoral Commission's Acting Chair and Deputy Chief Executive Operations visited the marae on 5 October 2023, this is what they also observed.

On 9 October, the Commission received a further complaint, that was also copied to Police, regarding a social media post made not by the marae but by another individual which linked voting for Te Pāti Māori to receiving kai at the Manurewa Marae. The Electorate Manager contacted the marae again to check. The marae confirmed again that they were providing kai to anyone who came to the marae, and this was not conditional on whether they had voted or not and not linked to voting for any particular party.

Under <u>section 217</u> of the Electoral Act, anyone who gives or provides food, drink, entertainment or provision is liable for prosecution for the corrupt practice of treating, if done "for the purpose of corruptly" influencing that person to, generally put, alter their voting behaviour or procure the defendant's election.

Although the ambit is broad, the threshold for establishing treating is also high - a corrupt intention is required. The Courts have previously held that the offence of "treating" requires an intention on the part of the person treating to influence the votes of the persons treated.

In this case, it appears that the marae was publicly offering kai and entertainment alongside a whole range of organised marae activities including whanau day, kapa haka day, health checks, employment expo, and the Electoral Commission's voting place.

It appears that food was being made generally available without reference to voting or voting for Te Pāti Māori or its candidate. Small scale giveaways such as a beanie are not sufficient to meet the test for treating. There did not appear to be any overt campaigning associated with the manaakitanga.

Based on the information we have, we do not consider that this would meet the high test for treating and have not referred the matter to Police.

There have been complaints about the playing of the song 'Proud to be Māori/ 'You're Magic', composed by Matua Dave Para in 1984, on election day. In the Commission's view, this song and the message it is promoting are not exclusively campaign related. It is associated with a broader range of activities promoted at the marae, celebrating maori identity and achievements, and instilling a sense of pride into Māori communities. In our view, the playing of the song did not breach the election day rules.

The content of the post itself is allowed – it encourages people to vote (and not who to vote for), which is not a breach of the rules in section 197 of the Electoral Act.

However we'd urge you to disable any comments until 7pm tonight, as users have discussed who they have voted for or who they plan to vote for, which would put those people in breach of the rules.

In addition, any post that relates to the 2023 General Election will need a promoter statement in accordance with section 221A of the Electoral Act.

On social media, you can put the promoter statement in your Intro or 'About' section, and it will not need to be on every post.

Please could you let us know what steps you've taken to sort the issue.

The above link will take you to Ms. Debbie Ngarewa-Packer MP's Facebook page, on which an election advertisement has been published that states free food (sausage sizzle and hangi) and giveaways will be offered at an event at which she will be appearing as a candidate, something that can be inferred from the attachment of Te Parti Maori's logo to the advertisement. The catered event is scheduled for Saturday, 8 September 2023. We wonder if the provision of free and substantial food, along with unstated giveaways, amounts to treating? The advertisement may also breach the Electoral Act because it does not contain a dedicated promoter statement.

Please note that while the election advertisement above was published on Ms. Ngarewa-Packer's Facebook page, a second invitation was published on the Facebook page of the third-party promoter of this event, "The BBM Social Supermarket". The following link is to the promoter's invitation and accompanying video https://fb.watch/mWj2tyCLYc/. The promoter refers to the event as a "Meet and Greet with the incredible Debbie Ngarewa-Packer" and highlights the accompanying food and entertainment provided during the day.

Finally, we have noted that a number of photographs on Ms. Ngarewa-Packer's Facebook show campaigners using a variety of election advertisements that do not contain promoter statements.





If a court convicts you of treating, you could:

- go to prison
- be disqualified from voting for 3 years
- lose your seat in Parliament, if you have one.

Before you give people food, drink, other items or entertainment, consider how much you're giving, and how much money it's worth.

Light refreshments, such as a cup of tea and a snack, that's part of a political meeting isn't treating.

To avoid complaints, we suggest you be cautious and restrained when giving out food, drink, other items or entertainment as part of your campaign. Be especially cautious with giving out alcohol.

If you're concerned that something you're planning might be treating, you can ask us for our opinion.

(1)

Every person is guilty of a corrupt practice who commits the offence of treating.

(2)

Every person commits the offence of treating who corruptly, by himself or herself or by any other person on his or her behalf, either before, during, or after an election, directly or indirectly gives or provides, or pays wholly or in part the expense of giving or providing, any food, drink, entertainment, or provision to or for any person—

(a)

for the purpose of corruptly influencing that person or any other person to vote or refrain from voting; or

for the purpose of procuring himself or herself to be elected; or

(c)

on account of that person or any other person having voted or refrained from voting, or being about to vote

or refrain from voting.

(3)

Every person commits the offence of treating who, being the holder of a licence for the sale by retail of alcohol (within the meaning of <u>section 5(1)</u> of the Sale and Supply of Alcohol Act 2012), knowingly supplies any food, drink, entertainment, or provision—

(a)

to any person where the supply thereof is demanded for the purpose of treating, or for any corrupt or illegal practice; or

(b)

to any persons, whether electors or not, for the purpose of procuring the return of a candidate or candidates at an election, and without receiving payment for it at the time when it is supplied.

(4)

Every elector who corruptly accepts or takes any such food, drink, entertainment, or provision also commits the offence of treating.

(5)

Notwithstanding anything in this section, the provision of a light supper after any election meeting shall be deemed not to constitute the offence of treating.

I am conscious that we have a number of matters that we are emailing you about. This is quite common in the lead-up to the election as we see an increase in queries and complaints as more material is published. The Commission is required to follow up where it receives a complaint and then provide an update to the respondent and the complainant once the matter is concluded.

To be helpful I have summarised them for you into one email.

Te Pāti Māori websites, Instagram and Facebook: we have raised these with you prior, and you have amended the Instagram promoter statement which now appears to be compliant. Thank you for this. Note that we have since (this week) received complaints about Te Pāti Māori websites having non-compliant promoter statements.

• Could you please confirm when the promoter statements on Facebook, <u>maoriparty.org.nz</u> and <u>aotearoahau.co.nz</u> have been amended to include a street address, by 5pm Friday 25 August.

Te Pāti Māori merchandise: we have also received a complaint about the merchandise being sold on <u>maoriparty.org.nz</u> not containing promoter statements. An example is below.

• Could you please advise whether these items feature promoter statements, how many have been sold and provide any other information you consider relevant, by 5pm Friday 25 August.



Te Pāti Māori logo change: the Commission can assist you to get this changed in time for the 2023 General Election, provided we receive the logo files in the formats listed on the form you completed (shown below). We have received the required statutory declaration, so thank you for sending that through.

• Please provide the five logo files by 5pm Wednesday 23 August in order to meet election timeframes.

Thanks for getting in touch about this. I will address your points below.

The brief depiction of a candidate on a website is unlikely to constitute an election advertisement under the definitions in the Electoral Act 1993. You may wish to submit other material to us if you feel it has promotional content in relation to a party or candidate, that could reasonably be regarded as encouraging voters to vote for them.

This is not a brief depiction:

- It's on their homepage the most visited web page and usually the first page people visit
- 2. The video occupies your entire screen no matter your device
- 3. The video is 9 seconds and loops. Rawhiri comes on at just 1 second, in 2nd place, and is on for 4 seconds the longest of anyone and occupies 44% of the screen time. (video attached)

For the three points above, this absolutely is an advertisement that promotes Rawiri Waititi, Co-Leader of Te Pāti Māori, therefore, the party too, and any reasonable person would reasonably regard this as an endorsement and encouragement to vote for him/them.

Imagine the Mental Health Foundation promoting Chris Luxon in this way. This is no different.

I know the usual strategy from Government Departments is to try to first brush aside complaints like mine, as they

take time, money, and energy to pursue, but this example falls foul of our charity and electoral laws, so I look forward to you addressing this through your usual process, please.

In relation to the Mercedes vehicles with sign-writing, we would need to see an image to determine if this constitutes election advertising. Election advertising is permitted, however, except for on election day and provided rules are followed (such as including promoter statements). The Electoral Commission does not have any responsibility for charities regulation so I cannot comment on that side of the issue. You may wish to raise those matters with another agency.

I provided the image below. Did this not come through at your end? Rawiri is 2nd from the right in case you missed it. And there's many of these vehicles with signwriting on both sides too.

Like the website, this is again very prominent advocacy and advertising of a politician and political party. Again, imagine the Mental Health Foundation driving around in multiple vehicles with multiple images of Chris Luxon. This is, again, no different, so, should be treated exactly the same.

The value of these advertisements needs to count towards the spending limit within the election 3-month window too, right?



If any loans which you mention are in fact made to a party or candidate then the loan will need to be disclosed to the Electoral Commission in annual returns, subject to the detail set out in the Act. If loans are to another entity and not party or candidate loans then the Electoral Commission does not regulate this.

Did John's ~\$300k loan to Te Pāti Māori (that came from the Waipareira Trust) get disclosed in this way?

I'm pretty sure it's illegal for entities to give interest-free loans to Directors, of course, otherwise companies would be paying for mortgages all over the place.

The Charities Commission is obviously looking into all of these issues as well, but I look forward to hearing how the Electoral Commission is going to respond to these breaches of the Electoral Act.

I have just read the <u>Herald's lead story</u> on this Waipareira Trust/John Tamihere/Te Pāti Māori corruption scandal, and would like to add to that complaint, please.

- 1. Beyond the financial loans and interest, the Waipareira Trust is a digital and moving billboard for Rawiri Waititi and Te Pāti Māori using charitable community trust funds. See photos below.
 - 1. The second image after just 1 second on https://www.waipareira.com/ is of Rawiri Waititi. This breaks charity and electoral laws.
 - Sitting in the carparks at <u>2 Catherine Street</u>, Henderson (behind the mall), are at least half a dozen \$100k+
 Mercedes Super Sprinter long wheel-base, all also sign-written with Rawiri Waititi's face. This also breaks
 charity and electoral laws. Prices attached, as I was looking at these for a tourism client a few months back.
 - 3. There is likely other marketing material carrying images and words from Te Pāti Māori MPs too.

For context, I only found out about this as I tried to park there to get supplies for my daughter from the Baby Factory, like I used to, but was yelled at by a woman running out of the building (not the woman in the photo) despite it being the end of the day and 90%+ of the carparks being empty.


- 1. I've heard from a pretty reliable source that John Tamihere has a flash new Rolls Royce with a very showy personalised plate (I can't remember what it was, but something like "Maori 1" rings a bell). Not a great look for a 'charitable man' under fire for his finances. You will obviously want to look into such purchases to make sure they were made from personal fairly-earnt personal income, and not from the charitable trust.
- 2. I'm pretty sure that it is illegal for an entity to give a shareholder/staff member/director an interest-free loan. The IRD will know. See https://www.ird.govt.nz/employing-staff/paying-staff/fringe-benefit-tax/types-of-fringe-benefits/employer-provided-low-interest-loans.
- 1. A related watch-out, of course, is that they do shift the loan to commercial terms going foward, but not on commercial market rates. This also breaks IRD rules.

So much for them being a charity or putting our West Auckland community first. So much for "trust" too.

Thank you for investigating this issue.



Thank you for your email of 13 November 2023.

The Manurewa Marae was identified along with other local marae including Papakura, Ruapōtaka, and Ōrākei Marae as a potential venue that members of the surrounding community would readily vote in. It was noted that it had recently offered COVID-19 vaccinations and opportunities to participate in the Census. It is used by the Ministry of Social Development to promote employment opportunities. It is also used as a community hub by virtue of its medical services and food bank.

The marae was advertised as a voting place issuing votes for the Manurewa general electorate and the Tāmaki Makaurau Māori electorate and like all voting places, it also issued special votes for all general and Māori electorates across the country.

We were aware of the candidate's involvement at the marae. Prior to agreeing to use the venue we agreed that the candidate would not enter the voting place other than to vote herself. We were provided an alternative designated contact person that we made the arrangements with. We also ensured that the marae personnel were aware of the rules regarding election advertising. Electoral Commission staff made sure that the 10 metre advance voting place buffer zone and the election day rules were strictly being observed with respect to the voting place.

The Electoral Commission was responsible for appointing and training the voting place staff. We set clear expectations that they must work in a way that supports a free and fair election. We have a code of conduct that sets that out, including being politically neutral.

On 3 October, we were first made aware of a social media post by the Manurewa Marae promoting a free hangi after people voted. The Electorate Manager contacted the marae contact person, on 4 October, to make it clear that the hangi (or any other incentive) cannot be tied to having voted but should be available to everyone whether they have voted or not. They were asked to amend their posts to reflect this. We received confirmation from our contact at the marae that they were providing kai to anyone who came to the voting place, and this was not conditional on whether or not they had voted. When the Electoral Commission's Acting Chair and Deputy Chief Executive Operations visited the marae on 5 October 2023, this is what they also observed.

On 9 October, we received your complaint, that was also copied to Police, regarding a social media post by an individual which linked voting for Te Pāti Māori to receiving kai at the Manurewa Marae. The Electorate Manager contacted the marae again to check. The marae confirmed again that they were providing kai to anyone who came to the marae, and this was not conditional on whether they had voted or not and not linked to voting for any particular party.

Under <u>section 217</u> of the Electoral Act, anyone who gives or provides food, drink, entertainment or provision is liable for prosecution for the corrupt practice of treating, if done "for the purpose of corruptly" influencing that person to, generally put, alter their voting behaviour or procure the defendant's election.

Although the ambit is broad, the threshold for establishing treating is also high - a corrupt intention is required. The Courts have previously held that the offence of "treating" requires an intention on the part of the person treating to influence the votes of the persons treated.

In this case, it appears that the marae was publicly offering kai and entertainment alongside a whole range of organised marae activities including whanau day, kapa haka day, health checks, employment expo, and the Electoral Commission's voting place.

It appears that food was being made generally available without reference to voting or voting for Te Pāti Māori or its candidate. Nor was it being accompanied by the giving out of campaign material. There did not appear to be any overt campaigning associated with the manaakitanga.

Based on the information we have, we do not consider that this would meet the high test for treating and would not refer the matter to Police.


Thank you for getting back to me, I understand you have been very busy.

Treating - Manurewa Marae

The Electoral Commission works to make voting accessible to all communities and to increasing participation within communities that have lower rates of engagement in the electoral process. In selecting voting places, it engages with people in different locations, particularly where voter turnout is low, to understand which potential venues will work for different communities. Following this, a formal assessment is done of each site to ensure it meets the Commission's requirements.

The Manurewa Marae was identified as a potential venue that members of the surrounding community would readily vote in. It was noted that it had recently offered COVID-19 vaccinations, food support and opportunities to participate in the Census. In our discussions with the marae, it was mentioned that they might provide kai and or activities to create a family friendly environment around the voting place. We were clear that the opportunity to receive kai or participate in the activities must be available to anyone coming to the marae and cannot be dependent on people voting. It is not uncommon for a schools or other community organisations to host activities around voting places on this basis.

On 3 October, we were first made aware that the Manurewa Marae was making an association, via a social media post, between voting at the marae and receiving a free hangi. The Electorate Manager contacted the marae management, on the same day, to make it clear that the hangi (or any other incentive) cannot be tied to having voted but should be available to everyone whether they have voted or not. They were asked to amend their posts to reflect this. We received confirmation from our contact at the marae that they are providing kai to anyone who comes to the voting place, and this is not conditional on whether they have voted or not.

On 9 October, the Commission received complaint regarding a social media post by an individual which linked voting for Te Pati Māori to receiving kai at the Manurewa Marae. The Electorate Manager contacted the Marae again. The Marae confirmed again that they are providing kai to anyone who comes to the voting place, and this is not conditional on whether they have voted or not and not linked to voting for any particular party.

Based on the information we have gathered and the assurances from the Manurewa Marae, we will not be taking the matter further.

Treating analysis

Owing to the serious implications of finding persons liable for treating, as well as possible consequences for those who have accepted the 'treat', before deciding whether to refer either of these incidents to the Police the Electoral Commission must consider what the offence of treating requires and whether there is reasonable cause for a referral in any particular case.

Section 217 of the Electoral Act 1993 provides any person is guilty of a corrupt practice who commits the offence of treating.

Corrupt practices have been described as deliberate acts to influence an election outcome through wrongful means. They are deemed to pose a serious threat to an election's function as a means of determining the true preferences of the electors, and which thereby undermine the basic integrity of the electoral system.¹ Corrupt practices offences are punishable by up to two years imprisonment or a maximum fine of \$100,000 in the case of a constituency candidate, party secretary or registered promoter, or \$40,000 in any other case.²

Section 217 provides:

"Treating

- (1) Every person is guilty of a corrupt practice who commits the offence of treating.
- (2) Every person commits the offence of treating who corruptly, by himself or herself or by any other person on his or her behalf, either before, during, or after an election, directly or indirectly gives or provides, or pays wholly or in part the expense of giving or providing, any food, drink, entertainment, or provision to or for any person—
 - (a) for the purpose of corruptly influencing that person or any other person to vote or refrain from voting; or
 - (b) for the purpose of procuring himself or herself to be elected; or
 - (c) on account of that person or any other person having voted or refrained from voting, or being about to vote or refrain from voting.
- (3) Every person commits the offence of treating who, being the holder of a licence for the sale by retail of alcohol (within the meaning of section 5(1) of the Sale and Supply of Alcohol Act 2012), knowingly supplies any food, drink, entertainment, or provision—
 - (a) to any person where the supply thereof is demanded for the purpose of treating, or for any corrupt or illegal practice; or
 - (b) to any persons, whether electors or not, for the purpose of procuring the return of a candidate or candidates at an election, and without receiving payment for it at the time when it is supplied.

- (4) Every elector who corruptly accepts or takes any such food, drink, entertainment, or provision also commits the offence of treating.
- (5) Notwithstanding anything in this section, the provision of a light supper after any election meeting shall be deemed not to constitute the offence of treating."

The offence of treating does not have to be undertaken personally for liability for treating to be attributed to a particular person. Instead a person can be found liable for the provision of food, drink or entertainment made by an agent on their behalf provided they had knowledge that this activity was being undertaken.³

The threshold for finding that the offence of treating has been committed is very high. This is because of the provision in s 217 that giving of any food, drink or entertainment must be done "corruptly", and where the provision is made for the purpose of influencing a person to vote or refrain from voting, such influence must be found to be corrupt.⁴

There is no definition of "corruptly" provided in the Act. Instead, whether or not the intentions and influence of the person are corrupt is a question of fact the Court must determine based on all of the circumstances of the particular case.⁵

A corrupt intention is an intention on the part of the person treating to influence the votes of the persons treated.⁶ In *Field v R*⁷ the Supreme Court cited with approval the definition of "corruptly" stated by Willes J in the 1858 House of Lords decision in *Cooper v Slade*: 8

I think the word 'corruptly' in this statute means not 'dishonestly', but in purposely doing an act which the law forbids as tending to corrupt voters, whether it be to give pecuniary inducement to vote, or a reward for having voted in a particular manner. Both the giver and the receiver in such a case may be said to act "corruptly". The word "corruptly" seems to be used as a designation of the act of rewarding a man for having voted in a particular way as being corrupt, rather than as part of the definition of the offence. I agree with what was said by the learned Judge at the trial, that if the moving cause of giving the money is the voter having voted for the particular candidate, such gift is contrary to the statute, as being given by way of reward for the vote, and therefore corrupt."

Under this definition a person will be acting corruptly if they are providing food, drink or entertainment to someone with the intention of influencing or rewarding the voting behaviour of that person.

Where the person giving or making the provision has more than one motive for offering the provision then a starting point is to determine the dominant motive, and whether it reflects a corrupt intention. However, it is also possible that where there are multiple motives, if one, even if not dominant, is an

ulterior motive, reflective of the necessary corrupt intention, the test for treating may still be made out.¹⁰

In *In re the Wairau Election Petition*¹¹ the Court set out certain factors which could be taken into consideration to determine whether the person making the provision had the necessary corrupt intention. These include:¹²

- 1.1 How open the actions of the person giving, providing or paying are. The more open and transparent such activities are the less likely the required corrupt intention will be present.
- 1.2 Whether people who are not voters were included in the invitation. The broader the range of people the provision is offered to the less likely a corrupt intention will be found.
- 1.3 Whether the persons receiving the food, drink, entertainment or other provision are deserving of it. Where there is an element of charity to the provision it may be harder to infer the required corrupt intention.
- 1.4 The proximity of the treating behaviour to an election. While it is possible for the offence of treating to occur at any time, not just during the election period, the closer the provision occurs to the election the more likely a corrupt intention may be found.
- 1.5 The number of times the 'treating' behaviour may have occurred.

Another factor relevant to whether treating has occurred is whether the recipients of the supposed treating were aware of any ulterior motive or obligation on how they must vote in exchange for those treats. In *The Wellington City Election Petition* the Court noted that if entertainment was provided to certain electors with a view to influencing voting, but there was no understanding or contract that the electors would vote in a certain way, those who provided the entertainment will not be guilty of treating.

In re the Wairau Election Petition the Court described a corrupt intention as an inference of fact which can be drawn if, based on all the circumstances, the reasonable and probable effect of the alleged treating would be to influence the result of the election, or to influence the votes of the individual voters.

Subject: Manurewa marae - principles for reviewing our practice around voting place selection

Kia ora

A while ago, Karl asked me to look through the material gathered around the complaints regarding the selection of Manurewa marae as a voting place and provide a bit of an 'independent assessment' of what the next steps should be.

It should be noted that this isn't a review of whether or not the decision was the right one or not. A number of steps were taken to ensure the decision was an appropriate one. But there are a few things I would recommend we put in place for all voting place assessments. I'm testing these thoughts with you in the first instance to see if you think I have missed anything.

My overall recommendation is that we review the criteria that we use to decide on voting places to ensure it adequately covers real or perceived conflict of interests and also provides direction for how people navigate these issues (or who to talk to if not sure). This applies to **all types** of voting places and political affiliations.

I think the final accountability for the selection of the voting places needs to be reinforced between the various teams- in this case Māori liaison, community engagement and voting services. That accountability should be reinforced during election planning. There are lots of perspectives and needs being juggled during selection, but it does need to be clear who is ultimately responsible and we should support them. Again- to reinforce that is for all types of voting places not just this specific example.

The person accountable is also accountable to ensure that an MOU is in place and signed. If not, the voting place is not used. There should be a clear pathway to escalate to seek support if needed (I know support is there, but we could be explicit recognising how challenging this can be) We should review the MOU to make sure it covers all important aspects, one of which is political neutrality but also health and safety, security etc.

I do think this can be built into our election design work and support for the field but if there is a by- election, a quick review will be needed before the voting places are selected.

Does this sound reasonable? As I said- it is what I glean from reading the material collated. Happy to discuss



A national, privately owned, community health care provider that has health clinics in Northland, Auckland, Wellington, and Christchurch. Funding

During the interview process they identified having had multiple successful government contracts (including MSD, ACC, Health NZ, Census, and Whānau Ora) and have a fee for service model. Founders (and current owners) also have multiple other business interests in NZ and Australia.

Contract

We ran an RFP via procurement which had multiple applicants that bid to work with Tangata Whenua, Pasifika, or Ethnic communities, we interviewed 3 applicants for Tangata Whenua and completed reference checks as well. Key Deliverables: Suppliers will primarily be responsible for delivering the community engagement campaign by sharing key campaign messages in their designated regions/communities. This includes facilitating new enrolments for eligible Māori who are not enrolled, as well as assisting those who need to update their details. The community engagement campaign will involve engaging and educating Māori about election participation (motivation, enrolment and voting) through presentations, meetings and hui. Suppliers will be required to develop a project plan for their delivery of the awareness campaign and regularly report on its delivery.

The Electoral Commission will provide suppliers with training and resources to support the delivery of the campaign.

Outcomes: These will be measured through the number of engagements completed, completion of Commission evaluation tools, and meeting general reporting requirements.

- Educating people about the importance of enrolment and voting.
- Share information about the voting process, from enrolment to polling venues and important dates.
- Enrol voters early to increase future participation in voting and to make voting quicker and easier.

Advance Voting Observation Visits General Election 2023

Prepared for the Chief Executive, Board members and Deputy Chief Executive Operations



Background:

The Board had a busy programme since June 2023 visiting voting places across all the regions. These visits provided insights into the operational and strategic planning to prepare and secure a voting place, understanding firsthand the challenges within an electorate and the region, creation of unique opportunities and knowing our partners who are working with the Commission. On top of that, these visits allowed the Board to connect with our Regional and Electorate Managers and take the time to understand their mahi and dedication preparing for the 2023 General Election.

To provide the CE and the Board with firsthand experience of what is happening on the ground within the election period, we would like to prepare a programme to visit voting places within the Advance Voting period. This will enable the CE and the Board to have context between the work and effort put in the preparation phase and experiencing how it works in the voting phase.

Purpose:

The purpose of the regional visits is to:

- Enable the Chief Executive and the Board to experience and observe 'live' voting places in action during the advance voting period.
- Provide valuable insights into the mechanics of a 'live' voting place.
- Connecting between the operational and strategic planning and 'live' voting place in action.
