INFORMATION ON CANDIDATE DONATIONS, ELECTION EXPENSES AND LOANS

WHO MUST FILE A RETURN?

All electorate candidates at the 2023 general election must file a return of candidate donations, election expenses and loans. Even if you have no donations, expenses or loans to declare, you **MUST** still complete the candidate return recording 'NIL' donations, expenses and loans.

KEEPING RECORDS OF DONATIONS, EXPENSES AND LOANS

Candidates must keep good records of all candidate donations, candidate expenses and loans. Candidates must keep invoices and receipts for all election expenses of \$50 or more for three years after returns are filed.

DONATIONS Complete Parts A to E

Information on Candidate Donations

Candidates are required to include in the candidate return every candidate donation or contribution to a candidate donation of more than \$1,500 (including GST), including a series of donations or contributions made by one person that adds up to more than \$1,500.

Candidate donations

A candidate donation includes any money, goods or services that are donated to a candidate, or a person on the candidate's behalf, for use in the candidate's campaign for election. The following are candidate donations:

- free goods or services that have a reasonable market value greater than \$300 (or \$50 if provided by an overseas person);
- discounted goods or services where the reasonable market value of the goods or services is greater than \$300 (or \$50 if provided by an overseas person);
 - the difference between the contract or agreed price and the reasonable market value of those goods and services is a donation;
- the purchase of goods or services from the candidate at a value that exceeds their reasonable market value;
 - the difference between the price paid and reasonable market value is a donation:
- extending credit to a candidate on favourable terms;
 - the value of the favourable terms is a donation.

The following are not a candidate donation:

- free labour
- goods or services provided free of charge to a candidate, or to any person on the candidate's behalf, that have a reasonable market value of \$300 or less (or \$50 or less if from an overseas person), or
- money provided by the candidate for his or her own campaign.

Instructions for Part A

For donations of more than \$1,500 (other than anonymous donations or overseas donations) you need to record the name and street address of the donor, the date the donation was received and the amount received from the donor.

Where you have received a number of donations from the same donor you should include each date on which a donation was received from the donor and the aggregated total from the donor. Aggregated donations are not contributions and do not have to be recorded in Part B.

You also need to confirm whether any person (other than the donor) has contributed more than \$1,500 to the donation (or more than \$50 if the contributor is an overseas person). Contributions of more than \$1,500 must be disclosed in Part B (or Part E for contributions of more than \$50 from an overseas person).

ELECTION EXPENSES Complete Parts F and G

Your election expenses during the regulated period (14 July to 13 October 2023) must not exceed \$32,600 (including GST). It is an offence to spend more than this.

Information on Candidate Expenses

Candidate election expenses are the costs of advertising in any medium that:

- may reasonably be regarded as encouraging or persuading voters to vote, or not to vote, for an electorate candidate (whether or not the name of the candidate is stated), and
- are published, or continue to be published, during the regulated period for the general election, and
- are promoted by the candidate or with the candidate's authority.

Election expenses include:

- the costs incurred in the preparation, composition, printing, postage and publication of the advertisement, and
- the reasonable market value of any material used or applied towards the advertisement provided to the candidate for free or below reasonable market value.

A candidate's deposit or the costs of hall hire, refreshments, the conduct of surveys or opinion polls, free labour, the framework that supports hoardings (other than a commercial framework) or replacing materials that have been destroyed through no fault of the candidate are not election expenses.

Further guidance is available in the **Candidate Handbook** - **General Election 2023**.



ENQUIRY ABOUT DONATION OF USE OF VEHICLE BY MANUREWA MARAE TRUST BOARD

The Electoral Commission has received an enquiry about donations disclosure for the use of a van owned by Manurewa Marae Trust Board which featured advertising promoting Takutai Tarsh Kemp and Te Pāti Māori, following recent media articles on the matter <u>Branded van raises new questions</u> amid Manurewa Marae claims (1news.co.nz).

The enquiry relates to whether the lease or loan of the vehicle should have been reported as a

To assist the Commission in considering this matter please could you provide a response to the following:

- What were the arrangements for use of the Manurewa Marae Trust Board van by Te Pāti Māori and/or Takutai Tarsh Kemp for the 2023 General Election?
- What was the reasonable market value of the use of the van for campaign purposes, including the cost of fuel if this cost was met by Manurewa Marae Trust Board?
- Has the value of any donations from Manurewa Marae Trust Board been recorded in the party or candidate's records of donations?
- Any other information you believe to be of relevance to the Commission's consideration.

If the lease or loan of the vehicle was a reportable donation that has not been reported, the candidate return or party annual return, as applicable, may need to be amended.

Under the rules in the Electoral Act 1993, a candidate donation is defined broadly as a donation (whether of money or of the equivalent of money or of goods or services or of a combination of those things) that is made to a candidate, or to any person on the candidate's behalf, for use in the candidate's campaign for election.

The lease or loan of the vehicle at nil cost or at below market value will be a candidate donation if the vehicle was made available for use in the candidate's campaign for election and the reasonable market value of the use exceeded \$300. It would then need to be declared as a candidate donation or contribution to donation in the candidate's return if the value exceeded \$1,500 (including GST).

A party donation means a donation (whether of money or the equivalent of money or of goods or services or of a combination of those things) that is made to a party or any person or body of persons if there are reasonable grounds to believe that the donation is intended for the benefit of the party. The lease or loan of the vehicle at nil cost or at below market value will be a party donation if the vehicle was made available for the benefit of the party and the reasonable market value exceeded \$1,500. Party donations and contributions to donations of more than \$5,000 (including GST) are required to be declared in the party's annual return of donations. The party return also requires a breakdown of monetary and non-monetary donations.

Candidates and party secretaries must keep proper records of all candidate and party donations. A number of possible offences arise where there has been a failure to comply with the requirements of the Part 6A of the Act. Where the Commission believes any person has committed an offence in this Part the Commission must refer the matter to the Police unless the Commission considers the offence is so inconsequential that there is no public interest in reporting the matter (section 2070 of the Act).

We would appreciate if you could provide a response by **5pm**, **Friday 19 July 2024**. You may wish to seek legal advice in preparing your response.

Further to your letter dated 12th July 2024, I have spoken with Takutai Tarsh Kemp and the Chairman of Manurewa Marae regarding this matter.

Please see responses to your queries below:

What were the arrangements for use of the Manurewa Marae Trust Board van by Te Pāti Māori and/or Takutai Tarsh Kemp for the 2023 General Election?

Takutai personally paid the Manurewa Marae for the use of a Van. This was for 30 days prior to the Election Date.

The branding on the Van was paid and declared in the Candidate Electoral Return.

What was the reasonable market value of the use of the van for campaign purposes, including the cost of fuel if this cost was met by Manurewa Marae Trust Board?

As noted above, Takutai personally paid the Manurewa Marae for the use of the Van, including fuel.

Has the value of any donations from Manurewa Marae Trust Board been recorded in the party or candidate's records of donations?

No donations were recorded by Manurewa Marae for the Party or the Candidate as no donations were received by Manurewa Marae.

Any other information you believe to be of relevance to the Commission's consideration.

The payment from Takutai to Manurewa Marae was not declared as a Donation in the Candidate Return - per the Candidate Handbook - General Election 2023 - Page 44, money paid to your own campaign is not considered a donation. Extract below.

There are exceptions to donation rules

The following don't count as donations:

- free labour
- goods or services you get for free from a New Zealand person that have a reasonable market value of \$300 or less
- goods or services you get for free from an overseas person that have a reasonable market value of \$50 or less
- money you give to your own campaign.

You note in your reply that Takutai Kemp personally paid the Manurewa Marae for the use of a Van for 30 days.

Under section 3E(2) of the Electoral Act, while the cost of running the vehicle (such as fuel) is not election expense, the use of the vehicle that is the subject of a contract, arrangement, or understanding for the payment of money is an election expense.

If the use of the van was the subject of an arrangement between Takutai Kemp and the Manurewa Marae, the costs/reasonable market value of the use of the van may need to be recorded as an advertising expense in Takutai Kemp's return of candidate expenses.

INFORMATION ON CANDIDATE DONATIONS, ELECTION EXPENSES AND LOANS

WHO MUST FILE A RETURN?

All electorate candidates at the 2023 general election must file a return of candidate donations, election expenses and loans. Even if you have no donations, expenses or loans to declare, you **MUST** still complete the candidate return recording **'NIL'** donations, expenses and loans.

KEEPING RECORDS OF DONATIONS, EXPENSES AND LOANS

Candidates must keep good records of all candidate donations, candidate expenses and loans. Candidates must keep invoices and receipts for all election expenses of \$50 or more for three years after returns are filled.

Further information on candidate donations, expenses and loans is available in the Candidate Handbook - General Election 2023



DONATIONS Complete Parts A to E

Information on Candidate Donations

Candidates are required to include in the candidate return every candidate donation or contribution to a candidate donation of more than \$1,500 (including GST), including a series of donations or contributions made by one person that adds up to more than \$1,500.

Candidate donations

A candidate donation includes any money, goods or services that are donated to a candidate, or a person on the candidate's behalf, for use in the candidate's campaign for election. The following are candidate donations:

- free goods or services that have a reasonable market value greater than \$300 (or \$50 if provided by an overseas person);
- discounted goods or services where the reasonable market value of the goods or services is greater than \$300 (or \$50 if provided by an overseas person);
 - the difference between the contract or agreed price and the reasonable market value of those goods and services is a donation:
- the purchase of goods or services from the candidate at a value that exceeds their reasonable market value;
 - the difference between the price paid and reasonable market value is a donation;
- extending credit to a candidate on favourable terms;
 - the value of the favourable terms is a donation.

The following are not a candidate donation:

- free labour
- goods or services provided free of charge to a candidate, or to any person on the candidate's behalf, that have a reasonable market value of \$300 or less (or \$50 or less if from an overseas person), or
- money provided by the candidate for his or her own campaign.

Instructions for Part A

For donations of more than \$1,500 (other than anonymous donations or overseas donations) you need to record the name and street address of the donor, the date the donation was received and the amount received from the donor.

Where you have received a number of donations from the same donor you should include each date on which a donation was received from the donor and the aggregated total from the donor. Aggregated donations are not contributions and do not have to be recorded in Part B.

You also need to confirm whether any person (other than the donor) has contributed more than \$1,500 to the donation (or more than \$50 if the contributor is an overseas person). Contributions of more than \$1,500 must be disclosed in Part B (or Part E for contributions of more than \$50 from an overseas person).

Example:

John Smith owns a publishing company. On 1 November 2022 he gives you goods for your campaign valued at \$1,000. On 10 November 2022 he also gives you a monetary donation of \$4,000. The money was given to you as the result of a fundraiser which John Smith organised and includes a contribution from Jane Jones of \$2,000.

ELECTION EXPENSES Complete Parts F and G

Your election expenses during the regulated period (14 July to 13 October 2023) must not exceed \$32,600 (including GST). It is an offence to spend more than this.

Information on Candidate Expenses

Candidate election expenses are the costs of advertising in any medium that:

- may reasonably be regarded as encouraging or persuading voters to vote, or not to vote, for an electorate candidate (whether or not the name of the candidate is stated), and
- are published, or continue to be published, during the regulated period for the general election, and
- are promoted by the candidate or with the candidate's authority.

Election expenses include:

- the costs incurred in the preparation, composition, printing, postage and publication of the advertisement, and
- the reasonable market value of any material used or applied towards the advertisement provided to the candidate for free or below reasonable market value.

A candidate's deposit or the costs of hall hire, refreshments, the conduct of surveys or opinion polls, free labour, the framework that supports hoardings (other than a commercial framework) or replacing materials that have been destroyed through no fault of the candidate are not election expenses.

Further guidance is available in the *Candidate Handbook - General Election 2023*.

Instructions on how to complete Part F

You should record all election expenses incurred in relation to candidate advertisements published, or continued to be published, during the regulated period for the general election promoted by you or with your written authority.
